Student work a legacy for all

Opinion is divided on the mural Josh Kully is creating.

Some people love the artist he has drawn in the montage, but find the graffiti artist included too dark and scary.

Others adore the spray-paint carrying person and the stylized writing just behind him.

The divergent views delight the young artist "because it kind of defeats the purpose of art if it doesn't appeal to everyone in some way."

Josh, 17, is on a tight schedule, though — he's got to have the work done before he graduates later this month, if only to ensure he gets it marked for his final art credit.

Josh says he's been interested in art for as long as he can remember, intrigued by the cartoons he watched as a kid and the panels he read in comic books.

"I never drew stick men,"



he says.

"I usually get into stuff that amuses me at the beginning and then I just keep at it. Like skateboarding. I love it as much as I love art"

Which is why he chose a skateboard theme for an art project he did for a calendar Grade 12 students at the school put together earlier this year.

For the mural, "I chose to put as many forms of art as

I could into it so that there's something that reaches out to everyone."

In addition to the graffiti and the fine-arts people, there's a sketcher and — once he gets it finished — a sculptor.

Tying it together are borders inspired by comic-book art.

Josh's teacher, Lisa Yamaoka, hopes he continues in the field because she's watched his talent and confidence grow

in what she calls his "street art" style.

"It's kind of weird," Josh says of how the mural has come together.

"I had sketched out the artist and the graffiti guy before so that came together and I just freehanded the others.

"I added the sculptor at the last second just to cover more of the art forms."

There was talk at one point of changing the designation of the room in the John Peterson campus of the secondary school where the mural is being painted — and that might have meant seeing his mural painted over.

"But that's not going to happen, so it's going to stay," Josh says.

And, yes, if he comes back for his 10-year reunion, one of the first stops he'll make in the building will be room 116 — just to check in on the little bit of artistic history he's leaving behind.
